I am going to put a small battery powered camera (called blink) on landing and stairwell down to church street so that I can see what's going on without asking to look at your very expensive surveillance footage. I am also going to put up a sign that says that the space is being Monitored 24 hours a day. Hopefully that will help a little bit...

Boy Burlington is getting bad... i've now had two employees over the last two months tell me that they do not feel comfortable coming to work because they are coming either really early in the morning or after dark. I sure hope something changes sometime soon.

Please let me know if you have any suggestions.

Hi Karen.

Yes, I will reach out to Sodexho and ResLife and ask them to remind their vendors to not use South Prospect Street to access campus. Barbara is correct that we have made that a practice and over the years, I do try to send periodic reminders. I don't know about companies purposefully changing their GPS systems to send trucks down South Prospect Street, that would be an odd thing to do, but I will check on it. I think it's more likely, as we have heard over the years, that Google Maps sends vehicles that way and I'm unaware of a way that can be changed on Google's side. I will have the United Foods' driver's comments followed up on.

That being said, I do want to clarify Barbara's statement about an Act 250 requirement that large trucks not use South Prospect Street. The Act 250 requirement is in relation to construction traffic for the Tarrant Center project only (which we have yet to start construction on). I have included snapshots from the permit conditions and the Findings of Fact below. As I said above (and is stated in the Findings of Fact), we do work with our vendors to minimize truck traffic on South Prospect, but it is not a permit violation if a truck does use that route, as Barbara seems to be implying in her email.

Please, can you talk to Jeff Padgett, who manages the DPW Traffic division, to convince him to re-install the "No Thru Truck" sign on South Prospect (just south of its intersection with Maple Street)?

I'm hoping to avoid having to prepare a longer email to provide all the history, photos, evidence and rationale to the TEUC committee. When I testified to the Act 250 Commission regarding my concerns about the risk of UVM sending trucks down South Prospec to reach the expanded PFG complex and the loading docs that are on the southside of that building, the Environmental Court said that UVM trucks and its vendors' trucks should not use South Prospect Street to enter the south campus. UVM told the 250 Commission that they had stopped using South Prospect for its truck deliveries since you, I, Goodkind, White, and Kingsbury met on this topic in 2012, and UVM told the Act 250 Commission that UVM would not start using South Prospect again for its truck deliveries. This finding and requirement is is the Act 250 decision for the PFG complex expansion.

Instead of entering campus at Davis Road, all of UVM's trucks entering the south campus, even the 48 foot long semi-trucks, should be using the campus entrance that is on the north side of Gutterson Garage. From there, the trucks drive on the north side of the round-about past Patrick Gym to reach the 3-way stop sign at UVM's University Heights Road. From this intersection, the trucks can turn right to reach the loading docks at the Living Learning Center or turn left to reach loading docks at the PFG Complex or at the rear of Simpson Hall.

This route, including the internal campus turn at the intersection of PFG Road and University Heights Road, is not too difficult for UVM vendors and semi-trucks. The semi-trucks have been using this route for at least 10 years ever since we had our 2012 meeting in the City Hall Planning Department's office on this exact same topic with S. Goodkind, D. White, L. Kingsbury, and the two of us)

It would be incredibly helpful to our neighborhood to see the "No Thru Truck" sign re-installed right away, and then have DPW update the ordinanc (CDO Appendix C) to reflect this please.

It will also help the city (reduce road deterioration, improve safety, reduce pollution) because UVM's many vendor trucks are exiting I89 at Exit 14, driving west along Main Street (this means driving through the intersection at the top of the hill near the Davis Center that UVM says is dangerous to student pedestrians) and turning off of Main Street at the South Prospect Street (another intersection that is too busy and can be improved by not having semi-trucks in the left turn lane), and then driving the full length of South Prospect Street from Main Street to Davis Road. Then the trucks turn north once they are inside campus. Thank you for your email.

To respond to your questions, no I did not vote for that amendment. I mentioned the vote because it was the single most pivotal vote the Council made and it solidified the trajectory of where we found ourselves until we were able to raise the authorized headcount in October 2021. I did not think it was necessary to disclose my vote because I did not vote for that amendment.

I rewrote almost the entire the October 2021 resolution that raised the authorized headcount after several other drafts would have failed to gain a majority. That resolution passed 8-4.

Walter, as with any legislative body, there are a lot of things that go on behind the scenes that voters do not see. Over the summer of 2022, while others were on vacation, I worked for weeks to pass the best police union contract in the state, if not the region. That negotiation to get a 10-1 vote was left to me, as council president, and acting mayor at the time as Miro was overseas. Press releases from the Administration after the vote as well as communications I received from the acting chief will confirm this. I don't mention these things publicly as they are part of the job but if you ever wonder why there are officers staying or new ones coming, the acting chief will tell you that the single greatest reason is that union contract. Similarly, the rebuilding plan passed 11-1 in June 2022.

I am attaching that section of the minutes from the June 30, 2020 meeting pertaining to that vote. You can find the full minutes on BoardDocs.

Hello Mr. Mayor,

Thanks again for taking the time to meet with the BBA and business community. Following up to explain my comment regarding the BPP sunsetting. Attached is the current depreciation table for calculating the BPP. What I was pointing out is that the "Cost Factor" column has increased dramatically over the last couple years. The way the tax is calculated is:

Cost of equipment in year purchased x 'Cost Factor' x depreciation rate x tax rate.

So to use an example - \$100,000 of office or guestroom furnishings purchased in 2019 will have a cost factor of 1.271 applied equaling \$127,100 which is then multiplied by deprecation rate of .8 giving a current value to be taxed of \$101,680 – which is more than what it was purchased for 4 years ago! So not based on reality as a 4 year old office chair is not worth more now even with inflation.

That being said I brought up the topic mainly to confirm that the tax will sunset as planned since it seemed odd the tax has actually been increasing the last couple years. So I appreciated your reassurance on sunset and am not raising a specific grievance on the tax, I just wanted to follow up to clarify – so no need to reply just an FYI.

I will past this information along to those who reached out to me. Given that it was neither under 30 degrees or raining or snowing today, I am not sure why there were more students wanting to ride the bus.

What is very troubling to residents is when they see empty or near empty buses, a lot of them, going down South Prospect Street when you can add another bus to the interior route. Yes, it is a longer route but you are putting wear and tear on city streets as opposed to your own streets.

As well, I have to wonder how you remove a bus if demand wanes. I would need to understand how that works – you decide to increase a bus, a driver must drive that bus. If you determine need based on the queue, and the driver goes by Redstone and sees 20 students waiting, the driver would then be obligated to report that and the second bus is eliminated. Just as seeing 100 students means a second bus is added. Perhaps you can see how residents might wonder if that is really how this works. How does the supervisor decide this? What are the criteria?

In the interest of transparency, I do think you should ask to present your bus routes and timing at an NPA meeting.

Hi Karen,

I hope you had a nice weekend in DC. It must have been great to get a taste of spring with the cherry blossoms blooming.

We met this morning about the Redstone Express. It seems there has been some confusion about a bus being moved from the On-Campus Route to the Redstone Express Route. We are not moving buses off one route to service another. What does happen is that when demand is warranted during morning peak hours and a driver is available, an additional bus may be added. Both routes are busiest from 8:30-10 am.

The buses are an important part of our Transportation Demand Management efforts. Adding an additional bus during peak demand has been a long-standing practice. We have communicated in the past that we will remove the second bus no later than 10 am and we don't add it in the first place unless there is demonstrated demand. The drivers estimate that during peak demand, there may be 100 students queued for the bus, but only room for 50, which would leave 50 students behind for an additional 15 minutes waiting for the bus to return. When that happens, the drivers communicate to the supervisor, who makes a decision on whether to add the additional bus. Likewise, when demand wanes, the bus drivers will communicate that, and the additional bus will be removed. The supervisor and drivers are aware that the last run with the second bus cannot start later than 10 am.

The route takes 15 minutes for a bus to complete a full loop. That is an additional 6 round trips added to the route. Again, it is not a defined daily practice, though it tends to be more in cold or inclement weather. We anticipate as the weather warms (hopefully soon!), the demand will wane.

As I mentioned in a prior email, this has been the practice for many years, dating back to before the changes we made in 2012. The last few years we have not had the additional bus as demand didn't warrant it during the pandemic and while more students were

engaged in hybrid schedules with more remote classes. I can speculate that because we didn't need the second bus for a couple of years, people are noticing it more now, but I'm not positive. Only Barbara had complained about this in the past.

I hope that helps to better define the situation. Again, we are not removing buses from one route to add to another. We really do try to balance our TDM programs and the needs of our students with the potential impacts on our neighbors. We have had a long history of this, as you know, including when we worked together with you, Jim, and the neighbors to remove the buses on nights and weekends from South Prospect Street. We are not opposed to considering changes that strike that balance, but in this case, when the demand is high we feel that it does warrant the extra 6 loops in an hour and a half.



As well, I have to wonder how you remove a bus if demand wanes. I would need to understand how that works – you decide to increase a bus, a driver must drive that bus. If you determine need based on the queue, and the driver goes by Redstone and sees 20 students waiting, the driver would then be obligated to report that and the second bus is eliminated. Just as seeing 100 students means a second bus is added. Perhaps you can see how residents might wonder if that is really how this works. How does the supervisor decide this? What are the criteria?

We met this morning about the Redstone Express. It seems there has been some confusion about a bus being moved from the On-Campus Route to the Redstone Express Route. We are not moving buses off one route to service another. What does happen is that when demand is warranted during morning peak hours and a driver is available, an additional bus may be added. Both routes are busiest from 8:30-10 am.

The buses are an important part of our Transportation Demand Management efforts. Adding an additional bus during peak demand has been a long-standing practice. We have communicated in the past that we will remove the second bus no later than 10 am and we don't add it in the first place unless there is demonstrated demand. The drivers estimate that during peak demand, there may be 100 students queued for the bus, but only room for 50, which would leave 50 students behind for an additional 15 minutes waiting for the bus to return. When that happens, the drivers communicate to the supervisor, who makes a decision on whether to add the additional bus. Likewise, when demand wanes, the bus drivers will communicate that, and the additional bus will be removed. The supervisor and drivers are aware that the last run with the second bus cannot start later than 10 am.



On behalf of the 250+ businesses and nonprofits represented by the Burlington Business Association (BBA), please accept the following comments regarding the Proposed CDO Amendment: ZA-23-01 South End Innovation District.

The BBA enthusiastically supports the proposed changes to create a South End Innovation District (SEID).

It is well known Burlington has a housing crisis. First called out in the 2014 Downtown Housing Strategy Report, the crisis was more recently highlighted in Building Homes Together 2.0 Campaign's October report that found Chittenden Co. is trailing behind the target of 5,000 new homes by 2025. The December Allen, Brooks & Minor report also found that vacancy rates continue to be historically low at less than 1%. A healthy vacancy rate is at least 4 times this, between 4-8%. Area businesses continuously report that a lack of both housing availability and affordability is one of the top challenges they face.

The proposed amendment would allow surface parking lots and other underutilized space to be transformed into a mixed-use, vibrant, multimodal community for the next century. Most importantly it would allow for housing for more Burligntonians to live near where they work and play; with associated positive impacts for our climate.

Specifically, we do have concerns that the proposed FAR of 2.5 is too low to allow for the vibrant neighborhood the SEID has the potential to create. Further, we support the proposed height allowances of up to 85 feet. Exclusionary height restrictions would severely limit the possible benefits of this proposed district. Concerns from neighbors that this density and height would erode neighborhood character devalues how neighborhoods are also defined by the amenities and people that live within them.

Every foot of height we remove from this SEID zoning excludes people who could live in it. We must take into consideration that these new neighbors have no voice in this process. We must consider young professionals hoping to keep their talents in Vermont, people of all income ranges who deserve a

place in our community, families who hope to send their kids to a new BHS, and overhoused seniors looking to downsize.

Thanks for reaching out again. Here is some additional context that I hope will provide more clarity:

- The removal of Coolidge Hall was in the 2020-2022 JIPMP. If you read the text before Table 11, it may become clearer that the
 table is both updating projects from the previous JIPMP (whether they are complete, not moving forward, or planned for the
 next 5 years) and identifying new projects. We have asked CATMA/VHB to move Coolidge Hall to the "Not moving forward at
 this time" section of Table 11. That is consistent with other projects identified in the last JIPMP that UVM does not have current
 plans to move forward.
- 2. The 190 spaces for "Residential Housing" in the "Unknown" category is an error and will be removed. This was mentioned at the previous Planning Commission Meeting. This is a double count of "Future Additional Parking to Accommodate New Housing" that shows up earlier in the table. UVM is considering two housing projects and associated parking with a timeline of one in 2025 and one in 2026.
- 3. The error of the 190 spaces directly under Coolidge Hall is an unfortunate coincidence. Because two items are next to one another does not necessarily mean they are linked together. Most of the projects on this list are not linked to another project by way of where they fall on the table. I do understand the confusion based on the language and the fact that the other housing projects listed have parking directly beneath them, but truly, this was just an error that we have already said will be rectified. It was my mistake not catching it in the table and I apologize for the confusion it has caused.

I spoke with Josh Katz from CATMA today about what was conveyed to the Planning Commission on 4/25 about the 190 residential space error. He assured me that was noted in the CATMA/VHB presentation to the Planning Commission that evening, so they are aware, as is Meagan Tuttle, that that line will be removed from the JIPMP Table 11. They have not resubmitted the corrected JIPMP yet as they are waiting to see if there are any other edits that need to be made after the Planning Commission discusses the JIPMP. It is likely the amended document will be submitted this week.

We have also asked them to move the Coolidge Hall line out of the "Unknown" section and into the "Not moving forward at this time" section. My apologies for emailing you on a Sunday. Hopefully you are outside enjoying this glorious weather.

There is some concern from a group of neighbors who live near the Redstone campus regarding page 44 of this Plan that will go before the Planning Commission on May 9.

Of particular concern is the line about "Coolidge Hall Building." It notes a -30,150 GSF change in building area but an associated change in parking of 190 spaces with an unknown date to completion.

I am hopeful that there can be some clarification of this line item. It would appear that UVM has a potential plan to demolish the Coolidge Building and replace it with parking right on the Redstone Green. Saying "unknown" in a plan raises concerns that by approving this plan and forwarding it to the DRB that while this project may not happen during the life of this plan, it could happen at any time and go to the DRB for permitting.

I am going to request that it be entered into the minutes of the Planning Commission meeting that there was a discussion on this item and possible action on this development be clarified.

A 190 space parking structure on the Redstone Green is not in character with this thoughtful landscape of this campus. It must be respected, particularly given the attention that must be paid to eliminating parking and encouraging TDM.

Lisa, is it part of UVM's long-term potential plan to demolish Coolidge and put up a parking garage? If that is the case, I would request that you be more transparent and say what your plan is. If this is not your plan, I would ask that your JIPMP clarify that and remove this item from the plan.

I will forward an email to the chair of the Planning Commission and Director Tuttle so they are aware of this concern but wanted to email you first and will hope for a response. I apologize for not reading this sooner but am a bit swamped at times.

On the "Future Additional Parking to Accommodate New Housing" you list 200 spaces but nothing more and you say this is happening n 2025. Please specify the location of these housing projects. If you don't, others can understandably wonder if that site is Redstone and a replacement dorm that will again have 200 parking spaces.

Since my last email, in talking with others who attended the April 25 Planning Commission meeting, it is my understanding that CATMA did say that it needed to delete the Coolidge Hall line on page 44 because it was already captured on the planned project list on page 43 where the locations are unspecified.

Hi Karen,

I spoke with Josh Katz from CATMA today about what was conveyed to the Planning Commission on 4/25 about the 190 residential space error. He assured me that was noted in the CATMA/VHB presentation to the Planning Commission that evening, so they are aware, as is Meagan Tuttle, that that line will be removed from the JIPMP Table 11. They have not resubmitted the corrected JIPMP yet as they are waiting to see if there are any other edits that need to be made after the Planning Commission discusses the JIPMP. It is likely the amended document will be submitted this week.

We have also asked them to move the Coolidge Hall line out of the "Unknown" section and into the "Not moving forward at this time" section. That is consistent with other projects that have been included in the previous version of the JIPMP but that UVM does not plan to move forward in the next five years.

My apologies for emailing you on a Sunday. Hopefully you are outside enjoying this glorious weather.

There is some concern from a group of neighbors who live near the Redstone campus regarding page 44 of this Plan that will go before the Planning Commission on May 9.

Of particular concern is the line about "Coolidge Hall Building." It notes a -30,150 GSF change in building area but an associated change in parking of 190 spaces with an unknown date to completion.

I am hopeful that there can be some clarification of this line item. It would appear that UVM has a potential plan to demolish the Coolidge Building and replace it with parking right on the Redstone Green. Saying "unknown" in a plan raises concerns that by approving this plan and forwarding it to the DRB that while this project may not happen during the life of this plan, it could happen at any time and go to the DRB for permitting.

I am going to request that it be entered into the minutes of the Planning Commission meeting that there was a discussion on this item and possible action on this development be clarified.

A 190 space parking structure on the Redstone Green is not in character with this thoughtful landscape of this campus. It must be respected, particularly given the attention that must be paid to eliminating parking and encouraging TDM.

Lisa, is it part of UVM's long-term potential plan to demolish Coolidge and put up a parking garage? If that is the case, I would request that you be more transparent and say what your plan is. If this is not your plan, I would ask that your JIPMP clarify that and remove this item from the plan.

- A. Describe what steps DPW is committed to make to take action and invest dollars to achieve Strategies 1-5 on page 2 of May 23, 2023 Parking Study. What are they?
- B. Three Parking Advisory Committee members propose that DPW commit to address May 2023 draft recommendations in the following manner. Execute a contract for a qualified group to further develop and promote the Park Burlington Website to create a digital tool to enable Burlington's visitors, clientele and customers to find and locate parking options during and after the proposed 3 year construction phase of the Main Street Great Streets project. As the project proceeds, updating current conditions will go far in creating a place which can be trusted to guide people to existing parking and reduce environmental damage from cycling around when they don't find the parking that is no longer available or obstructed by construction.

Some in the community speak highly of this tool and report that visitors and people considering Burlington as a business location are impressed that the website is useful in guiding them to parking they want to access. This digital tool directly addresses the first two strategies identified in the Draft May 2023 Executive Summary-2.

- 1. Maximize use of existing parking.
- 2. Strategically invest in Information and Technology

We advise DPW to Commit to execute a contract to continue to develop and Update Park Burlington website to be the tool that best educates residents, businesses, their friends and clients to find the ample parking that is Not familiar to most residents. We propose that there be an element of the contract to assist businesses and organizations in all sectors to incorporate Park Burlington on their websites and publicize the existence of this tool in physical and scannable signage throughout Burlington. These actions will insure their current and future clients find our parking assets during and after the 3 year construction period. The business community is committed to work with our employees, clients and visitors to access and use this tool to locate parking and learn about current construction impact on traffic patterns and on street parking locations. We need the right tools and the assistance to build a comprehensive marketing program for this parking tool. Park Burlington seems like it has a foundation to provide quality assistance to everyone if it is marketed well and kept up to date.

Digital wayfinding will augment the Parking Study's recommendations for updated, uniform and prominent temporary and permanent physical signage installed and updated before, during and after the construction starts. One example of needed signage is at the corner of Main Street and South Champlain as well as at the top of South Champlain directing to the City Garage across College street.

We recommend that the City commit to assess the effectiveness or lack thereof of physical signage every 6 months at a minimum during the construction and the first year afterwards. We advise that the City find ways to work with UPP and other private owners so that our visitors find options that are welcoming, safe and clean.

C. We urge DPW to develop additional parking options during the Construction Phase of this project. The Updated Parking Study does not comment on parking availability during the 3 year timeframe while the construction is occurring. Based on information shared by DPW in the April DPW Commission meeting, Laura Wheelock shared that more than 67 spaces will be impacted periodically during different phases of the project. Given that 20% of the project will likely be modified during construction due to unforeseen field conditions, it seems prudent to create additional parking to accommodate our visitors, businesses and residents. This is important because downtown neighborhoods will be impacted by those seeking parking who don't find what they are looking for on Main St.

Examples include but are not limited to:

- 1. Reduce to planned loss of 67 spaces on the project. Consider more 15 minute spaces and allow those to be renewed in Park Mobile or local kiosk one or two times. Consider places where there can be spaces that are retained.
- 2. Commit to expand available spaces at the Main St. and South Winooski lot through design improvements and collaboration with the Fire Department.
- 3. Expand the plan for South Champlain Street diagonal parking. Create one way traffic between Main and King Street as was discussed and recommended at the April DPW Commission meeting. Make that So. Champlain one way between King and College St. to add diagonal parking inventory and to extend the proposed one way traffic between Main and College St. One objection was that the street is undergoing major disruption while the residential building is completed. A fall completion would give DPW time to get this into their construction schedule for the majority of the construction of Main St.

Continue to invest and publicize the improvements to safety, cleanliness, illumination and wayfinding to and from City parking garages. Have the parking department within DPW explore ways to incentivize businesses and employees who are using the underutilized parking structures. Make sure that the City works with the business community to highlight the improvements and locations of these parking assets. What if there were monthly prizes that Downtown businesses offered to those employees who are using the parking structure instead of finding inexpensive or free parking on the street. What else can be done to expand use of underused parking at other locations.

Commit to Review successes and failures of downtown parking during the construction period. Commit to budget for and hire a consultant or team to report at 18 months after the start of construction to report to the Commission and to building and business owners, the City Council and residents on how the parking assets are being utilized. Also evaluate whether the parking study assessment that there is a perception that parking is not available, safe, accessible and clean. there is any change in perception that there is not enough parking in Burlington between the onset of the Great Streets project and

after construction has commenced. Make recommendations on what can and should be done to continue to build confidence and belief that Burlington has

Yes, thank you for your ongoing Main Street feedback. It continues to be helpful and incorporated.

At the last meeting, Kelly asked the City to go beyond pausing on the meter time-limit discussion on Main St to also pause the rate increase to \$1.50/hr even understanding that it wouldn't go into effect until after construction. We listened and have updated the Commission memo and requested action to remove the rate change from tonight's meeting:

- Converting meter rates on Main Street between Battery and South Union to be \$1.50 per hour to encourage turnover of on street parking to support businesses along the street.
 - o This will be postponed to allow more time to bring forward a comprehensive rate recommendation for:

In your 5/10/23 email to myself and neighbors, you wrote: "She (Lisa Kingsbury) was aware of the error as was discussed at the April 25th meeting..."

When you sent the email on May 10th, did you have the impression that UVM and/or CATMA provided a response on April 25th that addressed and corrected my concerns?

Did you (or do you) have the impression that I learned on April 25th there was nothing to worry about and yet I still decided to engage my neighbors? (I hope not. I wouldn't do that.)

Lisa also seemed to imply that the information she conveyed on May 9th was also provided on April 25th. It sounded like the two of you had agreed on this key messaging in order to undercut me. I felt that this theme of (we already told her) was mean, dishonest, misleading and completely unnecessary.

In fact, regarding the topic of the new dorm and its parking that neighbors and I worried was going to be a replacement dorm for Coolidge, UVM did not provide any clarifying information on April 25th. They only provided useful information on May 9th.

From the audio clips provided below you can verify that UVM and CATMA's comments on April 25th neither confirmed nor denied their plans for Coolidge Hall and its replacement dorm. They simply said that the new housing project with 190 parking spaces was reported twice on the list - higher up on the list - and on the line under Coolidge Hall's demolition. When they said that they had double listed the housing projects and parking, they didn't say my concerns were invalid or unfounded or confused or anything of the sort.

My concern is that your sentence (incorrectly) made it sound like I had been corrected by UVM but had still gone ahead and asked my neighbors to share their opposition to the Coolidge Hall replacement dorm design concept, as shown in the UVM's Master Housing Strategy document, and the planned project details in JIPMP.

This has been bothering me because I feel wronged by your words and the impression it created.

Please, I ask you to send a kind and respectful email to my neighbors (copy me) to say that "you owe (me) an apology because contrary to your earlier understanding, UVM had not provided useful information regarding the Coolidge Hall replacement dorm and the 190 parking spaces on April 25th. You realise this now that you have listened to the Planning Commission audio recording of the April 25th meeting; and you can appreciate why (Barbara) engaged neighbors between April 26th and May 9th. You realize now that not until the May 9th meeting did UVM communicate that none of the projects on the planned project list involve a new dorm to replace and be located beside Coolidge Hall."

The first two audio clips provided below take less than 30 seconds to listen to. They prove that UVM only discussed where the information about the new dorm and its parking would be shown on the project list and nothing else.

Will you do this for me please? In a nice, kind and respectful way? I would be very grateful.

Perhaps you can help with this please? I received a postcard from the city today. It is attached below.

As you can see in the highlighted text, the postcard indicates that the recipient property owner might be impacted by a UVM development project listed in the JIPMP. But as we have discussed, the JIPMP planned project list doesn't provide sufficient details for us to understand what UVM actually has planned and where the project is. Nor will this needed clarity be provided during the DRB hearing. Hence, the city postcard, the JIPMP planned project list, and the DRB review of the JIPMP don't provide sufficient public warning of UVM's development projects. Yet, the DRB will approve the JIPMP and that planned project list without actually knowing what UVM has planned. Since the city is mailing us a postcard, that indicates that the city thinks some public warning is necessary. But the effectiveness of this public warning is voided by the lack of information about the project location and other specifics.

For every project on the JIPMP planned project list, the potentially impacted neighbors deserve to know exactly which UVM project(s) this city postcard is referring to (because of the proximity of the planned project to the recipient's home); and the potential impacts of the planned project. Otherwise, the city postcard, the JIPMP planned project list, and DRB review of the JIPMP are too high level for neighbors to actually know what's going to happen and where it will happen.

For example, specifically what project(s) prompted the city to mail this postcard to me? Thank you in advance for your help.

The park was over run by 'aggressive' and heavily drugged homeless people. We are not insensitive to the homeless and their plight. But what we experienced in Burlington was by far the worst we have seen - we had just come from Boston and it was several orders of magnitude less there. Again, no reflection on your wonderful hotel but its location would keep us from going back.



Re: Funds for Downtown Support

Background: After the end of the state-run motel housing program in June, and in conjunction with the impacts of the national Fentanyl crisis, Burlington's business community is experiencing serious challenges. Recognizing that over 90% of Burlington's businesses are locally owned, the Office of Business & Workforce Development (BWD) understands the urgency of supporting these community members and the jobs they create in Burlington. While some indicators of economic health have returned to robust, pre-pandemic levels and we are working to support another strong winter season, BWD recognizes that these challenges can negatively impact commercial activity in our City. For many local businesses, a strong holiday shopping season and first fiscal quarter are critical to the ongoing strength and success of their business.

Financial Support: In response to concerns raised by local businesses, President Paul requested that the Administration identify \$50,000 for small business support and secured a \$50,000 match donation from the Pomerleau Family Foundation to fund increased initiatives by BWD that support small businesses in Burlington during the winter season. BWD has managed the City's economic recovery via the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) dollars and was able to identify \$50,000 in reserved ARPA funds that would be eligible for new programs to support our downtown. The eligibility centers around guidance from the US Treasury Department in the State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds Final Rule. This guidance enumerates that funds may be used to address the negative economic impacts from the Covid-19 pandemic-related increase in crime and drug use.

Proposed Use of Funds: BWD recommends a two-pronged approach to the use of these combined funds totaling \$100,000:

- Public Relations/Marketing Campaign: BWD proposes to engage a PR firm to discuss a campaign encouraging
 the public to continue to support local businesses and to continue to visit Burlington's Downtown. Such a PR
 campaign is well beyond the normal marketing budget housed in the Marketplace and BWD's "Love Burlington".
- **Better Lighting for Downtown Workers**: DPW generously provides <u>free parking</u> for all downtown restaurant and retail workers and all City staff, however, BWD frequently hears that the walk from places of employment to the garage can be intimidating at night. As a result, multiple businesses have communicated difficulty hiring staff to work evenings, resulting in shorter hours and reduced revenue.

City Council Motion:

To authorize the Director of Business & Workforce Development to accept a donation of \$50,000 from the Pomerleau Family Foundation and to reallocate \$50,000 in ARPA funds for the use of a PR/Marketing campaign and downtown lighting and security project. The purpose of which is to support economic activity in downtown Burlington and stabilize worker retention.

Thank you for your persistence in drawing our attention to this critically important issue for our City. Sorry for my delayed reply but I wanted to give this some thought.

Clearly our problem downtown is twofold: Making our downtown clean and safe for shoppers and workers has to be top priority, and marketing our strengths to shoppers from Chittenden County up to Canada is second to that. On the marketing side I would love to hear more from businesses if there are things we can do to help support you. It will be important for the City to have a successful tree lighting ceremony this year to kick off the holiday season and make sure the word gets out that Church Street is open for business and safe for families. On the safety side here are some initiatives I am currently pursuing:

- 1. Immediate support for security
 - Reform the trespass ordinance to make it more effective against repeat offenders and easier for businesses to use.
 - I'm encouraged by the new city funds designated for additional security Church St & Downtown
 - Further discussion is needed to determine what is most effective and achievable in short time frame
 - Huge THANK YOU to the Pomerleau Family for their matching contribution and continued support
 - Reconsider how the City can provide a compassionate response to people in mental health crisis
- 2. Working with State Legislators (both in and outside Chittenden County) on improving our statutes to assure that offenders are held appropriately accountable and working with the Governor.
 - Reform theft laws to make prosecutions and penalties clearer and more effective
 - Rutland is experiencing similar problems and I know the legislators there are actively seeking to address areas where our laws differ and are inferior to neighboring states.
 - Now that the problem has spread outside of Burlington, we have a real opportunity for legislative action
 - Appoint 7 judges to address judiciary backlog
 - We need immediate resources spread throughout the state to house and treat people in need (including the opioid settlement money).
- 3. Supporting initiatives for recruiting police officers
 - The hiring process for officers is painfully slow and despite recent actions by the Council to correct past mistakes, their current staffing levels doesn't give BPD the bandwidth for essential police department services.
 - I'm happy to support Council President Paul''s initiative for a photo if BPD thinks that is helpful
 - The political climate we created continues to be a recruitment problem. We need to work as a council to change the narrative.
 - Housing and affordability are also preventing good people from moving here to fill needed positions.

I know Burlington cannot be successful without Church Street and our posture as a city should reflect that. Please keep us posted on how you're doing and how we can help. I'm open to your suggestions as we try to navigate this very difficult situation.

Dear Members of the Burlington City Council,

First, we appreciate tonight's proposal to invest \$100,000 in support of downtown businesses. Our downtown businesses, most of whom are locally owned and operated, need your help. The BBA has been speaking to and collecting survey responses from downtown restaurant and retail businesses. Here is what we are hearing:

Over 80% report foot traffic is down compared to the same time last year.

Over 50% report that their sales are down year-over-year.

Half of the respondents have had staff quit in the past year, citing public safety concerns.

Over half responded YES to the Question, "Are you considering closing or relocating your business to a location outside downtown Burlington?".

We also heard that businesses downtown are asking for added security resources, especially during the upcoming holiday season. While the top choice for added security is overwhelmingly more police officers; Street Outreach members and downtown ambassadors were also called for.

BBA has managed a downtown ambassador program led by a private/public partnership for the last two holiday seasons. This program has provided services to downtown staff, residents, and visitors like:

Safe walk home or escort to your vehicle

Additional eyes and ears on the street

Direct coordination with BPD, Howard Center, and other service providers Peace of mind to staff that an additional resource is on-call and nearby

Given the current challenges downtown and the growing perception that downtown is unsafe, the BBA requests that at least 50% of the \$100,000 be dedicated to safety programs for the downtown. We also ask that a task force of downtown businesses and the BBA be formed to work in collaboration with the city to craft both short and long-term plans to address public safety issues.

While a PR/Marketing campaign would add value, we need to have a good story to tell. Funding in public safety measures would tell our long-time customers and community members that Burlington is working to make our downtown safer.

Good morning,

I want to echo Melissa's concerns. Outdoor Gear Exchange is also having historically low sales in Burlington which we attribute significantly to a drop in downtown foot traffic of 20-30% - most of which appears to be local Vermont customers choosing not to come into Burlington. OGE recently opened a second location in the Essex Experience in an effort to recapture some of the business we have lost. Sales there have met our expectations thus far but not without some concerning information: A majority of customers shopping in Essex expressed concern that they won't go to Burlington anymore due to the crime, the houseless and substance dependent population, and parking. And this morning we all woke to two more shooting deaths over the weekend in the Old North End. This only serves to reinforce concerns locals have about Burlington's safety - regardless of any details associated with those deaths.

This past weekend a DJ from PointFM was relating his own visit to our Essex grand opening this weekend with positive comments about the new store and the Essex Experience (this was not paid for or arranged for by usthough we have been advertising on PointFM for 28 years). He also, then added, how he prefers not to go into Burlington for all the reasons above. This is being BROADCAST state wide - nothing good can come from this prevalent sentiment.

Equally concerning is the national news highlighting the issue many downtowns around the country are having as suburban centers evolve into mini city centers like the one South Burlington recently developed off Dorset street or the one developed in and around the Essex Experience. While we may be caught up in a national evolution of downtown, we need to find a way to stop this trend in Burlington sooner than later and it will take massive investment and, for businesses like mine, possible subsidies to help us all survive to get to the other side of this.

As foot traffic declines, businesses are letting their leases lapse and either closing or moving their downtown businesses elsewhere. With less foot traffic restaurants are electing to be closed one, two, or three nights a week - further discouraging visits to town. This is a frightening downward spiral that will be harder to fight in the coming months with less draw from our incredible waterfront infrastructure. The Burlington brand is suffering and, I fear, at or beyond the tipping point.

Safety and Security resolutions and the recently approved \$100,000 in support and marketing/PR funds are helpful, needed, and appreciated. I know how much the police are dealing with and doing along with the many outreach personnel who are committed to the less fortunate segments of our population. I know that everyone on this email distribution is aware of these issues and cares deeply about Burlington in every way. I know that I don't have the answers but I am seeing the issues on an existential level for our still vibrant downtown, my own business, and my investment in our Church Street property. More significantly, it saddens me to see the city that I love and the city that instantly drew me to relocate to Vermont in 1992 in such a state of decline - especially when I see these issues dominate conversations at bars, at parties, and on the radio.

If we don't aggressively change the conversation soon there will be a lot fewer of us in the conversation. I welcome the chance to sit down with anyone to discuss solutions (though I know there are no quick fixes here) and to find a way to change the apparent course of things.





- (a) The Church Street Marketplace commission shall annually recommend and the city council shall annually assess upon nonresidential properties (as defined in Sec. 81 hereof) located within the downtown improvement district a tax upon the dollar of the property grand list to be used for the herein enumerated purposes of the downtown improvement district, which tax shall not exceed \$0.12 unless a larger amount has been authorized by the city council upon affirmative recommendation of the Church Street Marketplace commission. The revenues from such tax will be utilized for the purpose of providing a parking program which shall include not less than two free hours of parking for anyone parking in any designated municipally or privately owned or operated parking garage or parking lot located within the downtown improvement district pursuant to regulations to be established by the public works commission.
- (b) Annual budget. The commission shall prepare a proposed budget for each fiscal year showing the proposed expenditures and anticipated receipts of such year. The estimated net cost of operation of the marketplace, after taking account of all anticipated receipts available to meet such cost, shall, on or before the fifteenth day of April, 1980, and annually thereafter, be reported to the mayor to be incorporated, with such changes as he or she deems expedient, into the annual budget to be submitted to the city council for the next fiscal year. In adopting an appropriation for operation of the marketplace, the city council shall not determine that any portion thereof be raised by the city tax levy.

The Church Street Marketplace District defined below shall also be included within the downtown improvement district.
- (b) There is hereby created in the City of Burlington and within the downtown improvement district a special district to be known as the Church Street Marketplace District (district) which includes all of Church Street and the properties which have frontage thereon bounded on the north by the northernmost property line of properties bounded by Church and Pearl Streets, and bounded on the south by the southernmost property lines of properties at the northern corners of the Church and Main Street intersection, and more precisely shown on a plan entitled "Church Street Marketplace District" recorded with the chief administrative officer of the City of Burlington on June 27, 1979.
- (c) The Church Street Marketplace (marketplace) shall be that section of the district now or hereafter under the direct control of the City of Burlington including but not limited to the Church Street right-of-way and adjacent sidewalks.



Small Acts of Community – With leadership and direction from the Upstream Group, we're readying a launch of the Small Acts of Community Campaign. 

Why are we concerned?



Violence can impact any workplace, at any time!



Recent events in the news, and experiences of community members have highlighted the need for organizations to be better prepared to prevent and respond to workplace threats.

Workplace violence is defined as an act or threat of physical violence, intimidation, harassment, bullying, or any other disruptive behavior ⁽¹⁾ In most workplaces where risk factors can be identified, the risk of assault can be prevented or minimized if employers take appropriate precautions.

People are often negatively impacted emotionally, cognitively, or behaviorally for variable amounts of time during and after a crisis at work.

Nearly 2 million workers report having been victims of workplace violence each year ⁽²⁾

One of the best protections employers can offer their workers is to establish a zerotolerance policy toward workplace violence

Prevention





Environmental and facility safety

Conduct a security assessment looking at building access for staff and public, lighting, whether staff wear identification, window and lock security, and other elements of a facility's layout to ensure staff access to exits and safe spaces in the event of a confrontation or threat.

Encourage employees to report vulnerabilities

Train Employees to recognize potential dangers beyond escalated mood that require a call to 911

Implement a No-Tolerance policy on violence or threatening behavior

Consider additional security measures as appropriate for your organization (i.e. security cameras)

Consider security personnel as appropriate

Establish an outside lockbox for emergency agencies who may need access



Situational awareness



The act of being aware of what is happening around you, taking everything into account and adjusting your behavior to reduce the risk of injury to you, your family, your coworkers, or your business operations.


Why is situational awareness important?

Provides a mental model for perceiving, thinking, evaluating and acting in a systematic way Being alert makes you a less vulnerable target

Encourages trust in your intuition and/or instincts

Helps you to spot anomalies and learn what "normal" looks and feels like in a given situation

Conditions you to act based on your observations, rather than reacting automatically



Developing a mindset of situational awareness

5 behaviors for effective awareness

Intentionally and persistently practice the following behaviors:

Be aware of your surroundings

Stay vigilant and minimize distractions

Notice and evaluate other people

Take action

Trust your senses and intuition

Be aware of your surroundings

- Know what "normal" looks like in your environment
- Observe and listen for things that are abnormal
- Scan for unusual or suspicious objects
- Don't presume abnormalities are innocent or fine
- Know where all exits/entrances are have an exit strategy
- Know locations of safety equipment and protective gear

Notice other people

- Observe people around you
- → Watch for abnormal behavior
- Know warning signs of high-risk behavior:
 - Loud, aggressive speech
 - O Trembling, shaking, or sweating
 - O Aggressive acts or violent gestures
 - Tense posturing
 - Frequently changing body position, pacing
 - O Argumentative or angry demeanor
 - Approaching others personal space
- Protect against entry into your personal space

Stay vigilant and minimize distractions

- Be attentive and focused
- Minimize distractions
 (i.e. cell phones, ear buds, background noise)
- → Be aware of and minimize fatigue

Trust your sense and intuition

Your brain is constantly comparing patterns of current environmental clues to stored patterns of previous experiences. Your brain's analysis of these patterns is what provides you with intuition:

- "Trust your gut"—your intuition understand more about a situation than you consciously realize
- Tune into your emotions and bodily clues—when something doesn't feel right, at some level, it probably isn't



- Don't give in to "normalcy bias", the act of ignoring prospective threats because it's unlikely a dangerous situation might occur
 - Take indications of danger seriously
 - O Don't delay in responding to alarming/abnormal behavior
 - O Decide upon course of action
- Act upon office safety protocols/procedures to mitigate risks
 - Follow rehearsed safety scenarios
 - Employ de-escalation techniques
- --- Communicate concern to others
 - O Report vulnerabilities or threats
 - O Call 9-1-1 if appropriate

Situational awareness frameworks

Organizations should establish a behavioral framework for employees to follow to encourage quick decision-making and consistency.



Two of the most commonly practiced frameworks are:



The OODA Loop (U.S. Air Force strategy)


The SLAM Technique

OODA loop (U.S. Air Force strategy)

A process to assess confusing or rapidly evolving situations.

Observe the situation

Orient yourself to the reality of your surroundings, eliminating your assumptions and biases Decide what you are going to do Act confidently with your ongoing awareness




SLAM

Stop-

decrease distractions, stop your current work, make sure you are not in a situation when you are facing away from an escalated person, and try not to be looking down at your phone so you can maintain presence in the moment.

Look at your work area and find the hazards that are present to you and your workmates. Assess—the situation and what would need to happen to ensure safety

Manage—the current situation using protocols/procedures appropriate to your business/setting.



Prepare and train for emergencies

Key components of trainings to prepare staff to handle difficult interactions that have potential to become dangerous include:

Recognizing an escalated individual

Training in verbal de-escalation techniques

Recognizing an imminent threat

Practicing emergency scenarios and evacuation drills

Train staff to:

- Use person-first language to reduce stigma
- Choosing appropriate language to reduce the stigma around mental illness and substance use disorders



Emergency response





Best practices

Organizations should establish a behavioral framework for employees to follow to encourage quick decision-making and consistency.





Individuals who are agitated but cooperative may be amenable to verbal de-escalation techniques. (3)

An obviously angry individual should always be considered potentially violent.

Higher risk behaviors to be aware of include:

- → Provocative behavior
- → Angry demeanor
- → Loud, aggressive speech
- Tense posturing (e.g., gripping arm rails tightly, clenching fists)
- Frequently changing body position, pacing
- Aggressive acts (e.g., pounding walls, throwing objects, hitting oneself)

Staff should call 911 if they are dealing with an individual who is actively violent, uncooperative, extremely agitated and/or not responding to verbal de-escalation techniques.






Psychological First Aid (PFA)



Initial disaster response intervention



Promote safety

Stabilize victims emotionally

Connect individuals to help/resources

Address immediate concerns and needs | NOT to provide on-site therapy

PFA core actions

Contact and engagement

To respond to contacts initiated by colleagues, or to initiate contacts in a non-intrusive, compassionate, and helpful manner.

Safety and comfort

To **enhance** immediate and ongoing safety and provide physical and emotional comfort.

Stabilization (if needed)

To **calm and orient** emotionally overwhelmed or disoriented colleagues.

Information gather: current needs and concerns

To identify immediate needs and concerns, gather additional information, and tailor response/interventions.

Practical assistance

To **offer practical help** to colleagues in addressing immediate needs and concerns.

Connection with social supports

To help establish brief or ongoing contacts with primary support persons and sources of support, including family members, friends, and community helping resources.

Information on coping

To provide information about stress reactions and coping to reduce distress and promote adaptive functioning.

Linkage with collaborative services

To link colleagues with available services needed at the time or in the future.

Best practices for leaders(4)

The leader

Utilize informed compassion. Know your people and how they best respond.

Vulnerability

Be vigilant in identifying factors that have potential to negatively impact people.

CCO model

Compassion Conviction Optimism

Message development to staff

- Prepare communications, keep it short/simple/repeated
- Positives should outnumber negatives 3:1
- Messages should be delivered in order or importance prioritizing primacy and recency (do not include the most important message in the middle).
- Don't be afraid to admit if you do not know. Make a commitment to follow up.

Avoid snap decisions

Identify a trusted colleague to bounce ideas off

Supervisors(5)

Promote a sense of calm and control

Take breaks when needed— do not overwork

Reward and compliment others for their work

After action review and organization assessment of readiness



Root cause analysis

No name, no blame

Review what happened, if protocols were followed, what went well, and what needs to be improved

Reach out to internal supports/legal communications to determine best route for communicating with community members if needed



Honestly, things aren't so bad when you shield your eyes from the situation at the park or you pretend the graffiti is a form of artistic expression. We need to change their tone- this is their city, where they raise their kids and have homes. the negative comments are hurting them in ways they don't even realize yet.

I feel like businesses are tucking in their tails- the shoplifting site we all belong to is the most depressing place/ we have all just decided the crap that is happening is the new norm. Everyone has cut their hours down due to lack of traffic.

We need to remain positive for our mental health and that of our employees. If I don't pretend to be all happy & positive my staff will jump ship, just like our local customer has.

Good afternoon and thanks for thinking ahead towards the new administration.

I have attached work we did back in 2018/2019 when we took a deep dive into the Marketplace finances, core responsibilities, governance, and the possibilities of expanding the DID. The same issues and concerns remain relevant today, however the one glaring difference is the issue of public safety. At the time we learned that we pay some of the highest DID fees in the entire country due of our small size and imbalanced financial model. It is clear to me that the city benefits far more from a well-run and successful Marketplace/downtown business climate than the Marketplace benefits from city services. This is especially true now that our Police Department has been harmed by the ill-fated and shortsighted effort to defund the Police.

I might suggest you meet with a core group of business owners before finalizing the "transition document" for some valuable input from those of us on the front lines.

Hello Joe (and everyone else),

Thank you for reaching out. I am so sorry to hear that this is happening to you and others, and to your guests. It is completely unacceptable and horrendous.

We have charged him with one count of unlawful mischief (felony) and one count of petit larceny (misdemeanor) for the damage and theft that occurred on 12/29/23. Neither of these charges are violent offenses (not as our law defines it that is, I certainly understand that the conduct you have outlined is violent in another sense), and none of his other pending cases are considered crimes of violence. He is 20 years old and has no criminal record.

For us to *request* that someone be held in jail pre-trial (before they are convicted), they must be charged with a violent felony. Otherwise, our laws require that folks are released into the community until they have been found guilty by a jury or plead guilty. Coupled with the fact that he has no criminal history means that he will be released by the Judge after his arraignment today. To be clear, within the confines of the law, it is entirely up to a Judge whether someone is held or released. My office does not make the determination.

I will share this email and your concerns with the assigned prosecutor so they can attempt to get these cases resolved quickly, but that is a massive struggle for us right now given the covid backlog. We will continue to try so that he stops engaging in this completely unacceptable behavior.

Good Afternoon Kara,

I have thought about this response the last few days and I have to say that I'm deeply concerned. You start out with empathy which of course is important but the rest is just so obviously a copy and paste response. Not that the items that you mentioned aren't important but they don't address more immediate concerns and I think it's time to make some changes.

First we need to review the Priority Response plan because an officer should have been sent to the scene to make sure that the individual wasn't a threat to people and other businesses. Yes, technically it was "vandalism" but it was also something more and people recognize that. The department needs to as well. Submitting an online report that doesn't even provide an incident number isn't acceptable anymore. We need to look at that process. No BPD response is demoralizing for our businesses and the rest of the public. When there is response, some officers are rude and ill tempered when interacting with people further eroding community trust and respect. This needs to change. We need BPD to look at deployment in a different way.

We have to be innovative given our situation. The officer count is trending down again as of the March Chief's report. We are going to have staffing issues for the foreseeable future. How do we think differently especially now when there is widespread concern across this city about what this Spring and Summer will bring? How can we utilize mutual aid from other agencies and VPO? Maybe we need to look what it would take to bring the National Guard in and look at different ways we can utilize them that provides positive interaction with the public while keeping an eye on things. They could have a table for recruitment in City Hall park and do double duty. What would it take to make that happen. Maybe it's not possible but what we have now isn't working and we need to think out of the box in a way that has not been happening. We need to be nimble. We also have to address officer morale in a way that is not occurring. We need to be real about what is expected of them in terms of community engagement that will help improve community relations which then will make officers feel appreciated and better about working here. I, along with others, have been advocating for this for some time now and there hasn't been anything done that is substantial.

Chief Murad, please be sure that this incident is pulled and that someone contacts the owners to make sure they have the support that they need with regards to providing a police report that may be necessary for insurance purposes. Please confirm an investigation has been started.

Allen,

Firstly, I am so sorry that this happened to you. I cannot imagine how upsetting, scary, and frustrating this was.

I also want to acknowledge the personal financial investment that you and many others on this email have made to operate your businesses in Burlington.

Due to a decrease in their ranks, the BPD must "stack" their calls. Since 2022 they have had amodified priority response plan in place which I assume was being followed when you called.

Recognizing the complexity of the challenges facing our downtown, the City and multiple departments have taken on the following tasks to help address the situation from a support and enforcement perspective:

Treatment/Housing:

- Elmwood Pod shelter housing 35 individuals until they can receive transitional or permanent housing
- BTV Cares this program has not fully launched but is in conjunction with UVMMC and involves pairs of two (1 mental health clinician and 1 nurse) roaming the City
- · Largest number of units (including affordable units) being built in the City in over a decade to make housing more accessible and affordable
- Extensive financial support (over \$1M) in the form of grants from the City to area non-profits
- Rapid Response EMTs two medical technicians, 12 hours a day, responding only to overdose calls, and when not actively responding they are instructed to engage with the impacted population
- · I meet weekly with the Howard Street Outreach Team, the BPD, and loss prevention managers from large retailers to discuss the downtown challenges and brainstorm solutions
- · CSLs (Community Support Liaisons) social workers housed in the BPD to address the needs of impacted populations

Enforcement:

- · CSOs (Community Service Officers) unarmed/unsworn officers able to enforce ordinance violations
- Drug Trafficking BPD has active undercover operations and operations in conjunction with ATF and DEA
- \$15,000 recruitment bonuses for new BPD officers to increase our ranks
- State Level Advocacy -
 - Burlington has repeatedly asked the State to deploy more of the funds they received in the opioid settlement
 - We have actively lobbied the State to create more mental health and substance use support services
- 2 BPD Officers dedicated to the downtown starting again in May.
- · Parks Patrol Officer program reinstituted last year
- Park Ranger Program instituted
- · Active communication between the City and the State's Attorney's Office regarding prosecution of crimes

I and the City team are always open to feedback and suggestions on ways to address the challenges that retailers are facing. Please let me know if you think there is something additional that I can do for you and your business.

Tonight, our business was vandalized by an individual who appears to be homeless. They took our patio furniture and threw it at our storefront window, shattering it. We contacted the police to have the individual apprehended; however, the police instructed us to go online and fill out a police report. This response is completely unacceptable and portrays a negative image of downtown Burlington. It fails to ensure the safety of the community and our employees, especially at the time this incident occurred.

It is already challenging enough to persuade employees to come to work due to ongoing safety issues in downtown Burlington. Now, when directly threatened, there is no immediate response from the police. Additionally, our storefront has been destroyed as we head into the spring season after a long, hard winter. What proactive measures is the city taking to address these issues and ensure Burlington is safe? It was not only our business affected; multiple businesses were vandelized tonight.

I am in Washington DC today and tomorrow, attending an ATF conference and presenting about the success BPD and ATF had in Burlington with regard to our gun violence issue. But I'm reading this thread and acknowledging, uncomfortably, that we have not had the same success addressing less violent (and therefore less prosecutable, less jailable) public disorder. Our drug unit has made a lot of progress against traffickers, and are paying attention to new dealing crews as they arise and as tips come in. The in-progress case against the New York crew, some of whose members sadly died this weekend in a Colchester crash, is a case in point. But low-level sales and open-air use are different. As Kara related, patrol officers have also been dialed into this and will be doing all they can to focus on the Marketplace.

Thank you for your efforts Kara! And thanks to all on here who are raising our awareness about the issues and documenting them. Thank you Chief for focusing this effort downtown. Unfortunately, "all the officers stationed downtown unless they are called elsewhere, is not necessarily a lot of officers....or any. But it is the best we can do on that front at this time. Yesterday I noticed some folks hanging around City Market, arguing about the lies each tells to get a hit of crack. They were not being terribly disruptive and were not actively injecting drugs, but we continue to see a migration of open drug users around town.

Since the discussion here is about the parking garage, I've added Chapin to this thread.

Chapin, is it possible to get staffing in the parking garage to improve monitoring, accountability, and official eyes on the situation here so that our garages are safe places for our local work force, visitors and residents? Giving up staffing of garages in favor of auto pay may have a cost in terms of "eyes" on the garage. Interested in any ideas you might have to improve cleanliness and safety. I know you've been committed to addressing the graffiti which I greatly appreciate and applaud you for. know we keep asking for more.

Kara, can we get more focus from Street Outreach in this area as well? They could help with the feeling that something bad is about to escalate and erupt at any moment. CSLs could be another option here.

I am sorry for all that this is the state of affairs at this time and that we do not have any quick fixes. I'm also appreciative of the efforts on many fronts.

The Marketplace properties collectively pay over \$2,000,000 in annual real estate taxes plus marketplace fees, yet as you point out we have lost the police coverage that our taxes support. It is interesting that the city is paying \$500,000 for private security for city property but offered nothing to the Marketplace.

The level of retail theft on the street is at an all-time high with no end in sight. Now word is out in the retail community that Burlington is riddled with theft, open drug use, and worse. We lost a new tenant for Church St. ready to fill the Black Dimond space due to the CEO hearing of Burlington's problems. I am fearful that without a greater police presence within our downtown our community will experience further decline.

I've asked the same question and here's what was explained to me.

Although the PD is authorized for up to 87 officers, when the PD budget is made the salary portion is only made with an estimate of the actual numbers that the chief thinks he is likely to be able to hire. This means that the PD budget comes into the mayor at a reduction of what it otherwise would have been. The City then has the ability to spend that money in other ways, for example half a million dollars for private security for city buildings... It does not, however, go unused, especially in a budget crunch year. If someone thinks I've got this wrong please let us both know. -Mark

Hi- I wanted to share images from the Marketplace Garage today. You may get these same images from multiple sources. They are not very clear but the photographer didn't feel safe. What is happening is open drug use with needles.

The parking garage is the gateway to the downtown. Locals & tourists park here & often it's their introduction to our city.

The stairwells are often littered with needles, garbage & blood stained clothing/rags. It's also where shoplifters leave hangers from their latest raid on LuLuLemon. If I were a visitor to a city for the first time & saw these things when I got out of my car with my children in tow I would not come back & I would tell me friends. BTV shouldn't allow this to happen.

Burlington is no longer an orderly, safe, secure, or prosperous place to be. It feels like all of the laws have completely gone out the window- citizens & merchants are not being supported by our leaders. While focusing on one group of people, who are in a heartbreaking struggle, you are neglecting the rest of the people- those going to work everyday, children who love to play in the water fountain in the park & climb the rocks & families looking to enjoy a meal & shopping with their loved ones.

Mayor, I thank you for your time in meeting with us last week via zoom- but we need immediate action. You heard from merchants but the things you were told are things we have been talking about since 2020 and things have only gotten worse.

Other cities are going through the same thing, some ahead of us. We need to look at what has worked & not worked for them to make our city a livable place for ALL.

Thank you for looping me into the thread Joan. Team DPW agrees that there are current issues that need additional resources to manage in Marketplace Garage.

I convened a cross-departmental meeting this morning on the topic and we will be meeting weekly. I have directed my team to document the incidents and issues in a written format for my review. I have made some operational changes in the Marketplace Garage this week to respond to recent incidents. Team DPW will also be rebidding our security contract for garage security services this year. The garage staffing is not much different than before. Yes, previously we had booth attendants sitting in booths at the exit. Now we have Parking Services Agents circulating through the garages confirming customers have paid to park. While our Parking Services Agents aren't always around, they do circulate within the garages more than the booth attendants before. We still have the Parking Maintenance Workers on site same as always. We have one vacant position that we are looking to fill – and welcome any referrals people can give us!

Thank you for your efforts Kara! And thanks to all on here who are raising our awareness about the issues and documenting them. Thank you Chief for focusing this effort downtown. Unfortunately, "all the officers stationed downtown unless they are called elsewhere, is not necessarily a lot of officers....or any. But it is the best we can do on that front at this time. Yesterday I noticed some folks hanging around City Market, arguing about the lies each tells to get a hit of crack. They were not being terribly disruptive and were not actively injecting drugs, but we continue to see a migration of open drug users around town.

Since the discussion here is about the parking garage, I've added Chapin to this thread.

Chapin, is it possible to get staffing in the parking garage to improve monitoring, accountability, and official eyes on the situation here so that our garages are safe places for our local work force, visitors and residents? Giving up staffing of garages in favor of auto pay may have a cost in terms of "eyes" on the garage. Interested in any ideas you might have to improve cleanliness and safety. I know you've been committed to addressing the graffiti which I greatly appreciate and applaud you for. I also know we keep asking for more.

Kara, can we get more focus from Street Outreach in this area as well? They could help with the feeling that something bad is about to escalate and erupt at any moment. CSLs could be another option here.

I am sorry for all that this is the state of affairs at this time and that we do not have any quick

fixes. I'm also appreciative of the efforts on many fronts.

Although the PD is authorized for up to 87 officers, when the PD budget is made the salary portion is only made with an estimate of the actual numbers that the chief thinks he is likely to be able to hire. It is true that shoplifting on the Top Block has gotten out of control. There are individuals clearly targeting certain stores and the situation has been further complicated by one store's corporate headquarters having a policy not to file charges (recently resolved) and the lack of a police response. We have a few brave people who are working to intervene in attempts at retail theft and at times they have been successful. Regrettably residents and visitors see these events and comment on them. You don't need to look further than our local Reddit sub. We are also still in the mist of severe drug crisis and we have no support from the Governor. We must continue to diversify our community safety options and help get more people into recovery. We have a long way to go.

Having said all that we must remember that Burlington is still a great city with a lot to offer. This past weekend was amazing, the Juneteenth event was fantastic and Burlington's downtown was full of visitors. City Hall Park was full of people. Overall Tripadvisor reviews for Church Street reflect the love for this area. There are 21 "Terrible", 40 "Poor", 167 "Average", 653 "Very Good", and 1121 "Excellent" reviews with an average of 4.5 out of 5. I found the review that you are referencing and I believe that it was submitted by a troll and may not be a real "visitor". I haven't used Tripadvisor in a long time but I was able to reset my password, logged in and reported the review as it contains racisit and homophobic language. I encourage others to do the same. The review is locatedhere for others who wish to see and report it, once on the page please scroll down. With regards to other reviews that are less than stellar, some make legimate points about crime and drug use in our area but some honestly weren't educated on the variety of restuarants available to them in our area. Hello Community Safety Advisors –

Thank you for all your hard work over the last 5-6 weeks to help my administration begin to understand where we can and need to evolve our community safety response strategies. I sat with your recommendations and came up with the following core immediate things I would like to pursue as a city. I picked these items based on a loose application of the S.M.A.R.T.I.E. model that looks at goals and determines if they are specific, measurable, achievable, relevant, timeline, it-reasoned (meaning, data informed), and equitable. These are the items we will be discussing with city staff on Tuesday, July 9th. Your additional ideas will not be lost. I will be using them in the months to come as we welcome on a new staff member in my office to work specifically on community safety. More on that below.

Core Recommendations

1. Improve dispatch effectiveness via better response, strategic triage, better tone/engagement with public which includes how they speak about safety/staffing. Couple this with public education on who to call for what/when and how non-emergency number works - to be done by BPD and City in general. Also, improve outcome of when people call the

non-emergency number.

- 2. Related to the above, improving the customer service when people go to the Police Department for help or information. Consider staffing the entry-way (need not be a sworn officer). Make sure any informational signage is clear, simple, and in commonly-spoken languages besides just English.
- 3. More public bathrooms.
- 4. Better coordination between the BPD, State's Attorney, and Courts on criminal justice work in general, but specifically offenders (release and reentry).
- 5. Coordinate and use data to inform community safety staffing, including staffing schedules (e.g., making sure there are officers on duty during beginning and end of school day), job assignments (CSL, CSO, officer, Street Outreach, Rangers), and review current teaming efforts for better response/outcomes (ex: not having police at a call that escalates situation).
- 6. Improve case management coordination across partners, including the city.

Other Important Updates

The City is moving forward on several other areas we touched on in our last three meetings. Here is a brief update on these items. I am happy to answer questions on any of these things next week.

- Implementing a temporary camping plan for warm months of 2024. We shared a draft camping plan with the City Council in mid June and incorporated feedback on that plan. We will present it again on July 15th to the City Council. Within this plan there are three locations identified to offer basic support services (dumpster, bathroom, water access, and sharps containers). The money for these items was approved in the FY25 Budget vote on June 24th.
- The legislature overturned the Governor's veto of H.72, a bill allowing Burlington to open the first Overdose Prevention Center in the state. We started to brainstorm initial steps of this important next step to support people with opioid use disorder with Comm Stat in late June. We will begin work on initial steps in the coming weeks which including siting the center, zoning and legal considerations, community partner coordination, community engagement, research, and core staffing to successfully bring this center online.
- We are actively working to find a site for a low barrier shelter for the colder months in the City again. We are at the very early stages and working with the state to consider our funding options. We expect a significant increase of unhoused individuals in the fall and winter due to changes to the state's General Assistance Emergency Housing Program and specifically the Adverse Weather Conditions Program.
- We have a cross-department "Hot Spot" coordination team meeting since May to find solutions and adapt our response to known areas in the city where problematic and/or illegal behavior is taking place. We started with the library and Marketplace Garage and are working with community partners to interrupt trends. We are seeing some initial improvements.
- We are beginning to bring together regional coordination efforts across towns on public safety efforts. I cannot share more on this at this moment, but more soon.
- In the FY25 budget, the City Council approved the hiring of a Special Assistant on Community Safety to work within the Mayor's Office. This two-year position will strategically help us coordinate, assess, and develop new approaches to community safety response. This is a critical part of the work ahead. We are posting the position in the coming days and hope to quickly hire this position.
- We are organizing a meeting with BHS youth and my office before school begins to hear directly from youth what more we

need to do as a city. Thank you to Gretchen who has been an advisor in this group and requested this!

Mayor,

Thanks for sending this out to all of us. I do want to "Say the thing." Last meeting, I had mentioned the community needed to better understand who they need to call and when they need to call for a Police response. I felt the direction the conversation went was not what I meant when I made the statement. I have been thinking a lot about our time together and what I see daily in our community. I was troubled to hear that many people will call Police and not receive the support or actions that they feel they deserve. That is confusing to me and alarming, but that Is where I had hoped the conversation would have taken us. If someone calls to report a crime, concern or issue and believes they deserve a Police response I am not trying to discredit that belief. But the question is, do they?

Jane Doe calls to report an active transaction of narcotics, someone injecting drugs in City Hall Park or a suspicious looking person in a vehicle parked down the street should the expectation be that those calls receive immediate attention when staffing at that moment in time may be an officer in charge and three others for the whole City. If we then share with others that Polce is unresponsive because our call did not get the attention that we feel it deserved are we perpetuating a false narrative.

When people were reporting that Police were unresponsive to the safety needs of the community were their specific examples of this such as active assaults, robberies, home invasions, violent crimes. I am trying to grasp what was said and better understand what the comments were meant to achieve.

I wish that we had many more weeks to work because the City is in a Crisis and for many it is not a safe place to live and work right now. This work was difficult as there is not one single thing or strategy that could be implemented overnight to alleviate the burden being placed on our Dept Heads and staff. I thank everyone for taking the time to put in the work on this committee.

Hi Paul,
Thank you for sending these additional thoughts. I am hopeful we can work to clarify the community safety response part of the conversation from last time when we gather tomorrow. I heard in our advisor discussions a combination of people (the general public) not getting the right kind of help when they need it combined with confusion on what type of help is available. We didn't get into the weeds on the types of calls as you noted, so it may be good to have a few examples of what folks have experienced to build more understanding here. The combination of not getting a response and assumptions on what police should/should not respond to then creates a wide range of expectations. We also can do better at helping people know what they can expect, who to call to be more informed on who to contact, and looking at coordination/strengthening what we can. This was my intention in the first recommendation that seemed to read a bit to heavily on dispatch vs the larger response system. I reworded my original draft of recommendations to see if that can help clarify things (see below).
Tomorrow we will work to clarify, begin to map out what needs more work and what can be implemented from the 6 recommendations sooner rather than later. I agree we need more time and I am hopeful the new Senior Advisor on Community Safety will help to reconvene advisors this fall and continued to advance this work in deeper and more impactful ways.

If someone calls to report a crime, concern or issue and believes they deserve a Police response I am not trying to discredit that belief. But the question is, do they?

Jane Doe calls to report an active transaction of narcotics, someone injecting drugs in City Hall Park or a suspicious looking person in a vehicle parked down the street should the expectation be that those calls receive immediate attention when staffing at that moment in time may be an officer in charge and three others for the whole City. If we then share with others that Polce is unresponsive because our call did not get the attention that we feel it deserved are we perpetuating a false narrative.

When people were reporting that Police were unresponsive to the safety needs of the community were their specific examples of this such as active assaults, robberies, home invasions, violent crimes. I am trying to grasp what was said and better understand what the comments were meant to achieve.

I wish that we had many more weeks to work because the City is in a Crisis and for many it is not a safe place to live and work right now. This work was difficult as there is not one single thing or strategy that could be implemented overnight to alleviate the burden being placed on our Dept Heads and staff. I thank everyone for taking the time to put in the work on this committee.

Subject: Top Community Safety Recommendations and July 9

Hello Community Safety Advisors -

Thank you for all your hard work over the last 5-6 weeks to help my administration begin to understand where we can and need to evolve our community safety response strategies. I sat with your recommendations and came up with the following core immediate things I would like to pursue as a city. I picked these items based on a loose application of the S.M.A.R.T.I.E. model that looks at goals and determines if they are specific, measurable, achievable, relevant, timeline, it-reasoned (meaning, data informed), and equitable. These are the items we will be discussing with city staff on Tuesday, July 9th. Your additional ideas will not be lost. I will be using them in the months to come as we welcome on a new staff member in my office to work specifically on community safety. More on that below.

Core Recommendations

- 1. Improve dispatch effectiveness via better response, strategic triage, better tone/engagement with public which includes how they speak about safety/staffing. Couple this with public education on who to call for what/when and how non-emergency number works to be done by BPD and City in general. Also, improve outcome of when people call the non-emergency number.
- 2. Related to the above, improving the customer service when people go to the Police Department for help or information. Consider staffing the entry-way (need not be a sworn officer). Make sure any informational signage is clear, simple, and in commonly-spoken languages besides just English.
- 3. More public bathrooms.
- 4. Better coordination between the BPD, State's Attorney, and Courts on criminal justice work in general, but specifically offenders (release and reentry).
- 5. Coordinate and use data to inform community safety staffing, including staffing schedules (e.g., making sure there are officers on duty during beginning and end of school day), job assignments (CSL, CSO, officer, Street Outreach, Rangers), and review current teaming efforts for better response/outcomes (ex: not having police at a call that escalates situation).
- 6. Improve case management coordination across partners, including the city.

Preparation for July 9th Meeting (Homework)

- 1. Please review the core recommendations and reflect on if there is anything missing that is urgent and immediately actionable
- 2. Skim the notes from our last meeting (attached)
- 3. Here are the city staff who are invited to join us next week. I was mistaken about the number of folks who we invited (my apologies). However, not everyone can attend due to vacations/conflicts. I indicated YES for folks who did confirm. I am asking city staff to come ready to listen to understand why the recommendations were made, ready to build trust with this group and to honor your work/time invested into providing this feedback, and ready to collaborate on what it will take to implement these recommendations with a productive attitude. This group is the same group we convened in May to help inform community safety investments we should make in FY25 that could have a more immediate impact on our community. These folks are all interfacing with community safety in one way or another. (I may not have every job title correct)

Other Important Updates

The City is moving forward on several other areas we touched on in our last three meetings. Here is a brief update on these items. I am happy to answer questions on any of these things next week.

- Implementing a temporary camping plan for warm months of 2024. We shared a draft camping plan with the City Council in
 mid June and incorporated feedback on that plan. We will present it again on July 15th to the City Council. Within this plan
 there are three locations identified to offer basic support services (dumpster, bathroom, water access, and sharps
 containers). The money for these items was approved in the FY25 Budget vote on June 24th.
- The legislature overturned the Governor's veto of H.72, a bill allowing Burlington to open the first Overdose Prevention Center in the state. We started to brainstorm initial steps of this important next step to support people with opioid use disorder with Comm Stat in late June. We will begin work on initial steps in the coming weeks which including siting the center, zoning and legal considerations, community partner coordination, community engagement, research, and core staffing to successfully bring this center online.
- We are actively working to find a site for a low barrier shelter for the colder months in the City again. We are at the very early stages and working with the state to consider our funding options. We expect a significant increase of unhoused individuals in the fall and winter due to changes to the state's General Assistance Emergency Housing Program and specifically the Adverse Weather Conditions Program.
- We have a cross-department "Hot Spot" coordination team meeting since May to find solutions and adapt our response to known areas in the city where problematic and/or illegal behavior is taking place. We started with the library and Marketplace Garage and are working with community partners to interrupt trends. We are seeing some initial improvements.
- We are beginning to bring together regional coordination efforts across towns on public safety efforts. I cannot share more on this at this moment, but more soon.
- In the FY25 budget, the City Council approved the hiring of a Special Assistant on Community Safety to work within the Mayor's Office. This two-year position will strategically help us coordinate, assess, and develop new approaches to community safety response. This is a critical part of the work ahead. We are posting the position in the coming days and hope to quickly hire this position.
- We are organizing a meeting with BHS youth and my office before school begins to hear directly from youth what more we need to do as a city. Thank you to Gretchen who has been an advisor in this group and requested this!

Kelly, thank you again for inviting me to the last BBA board meeting to meet your leadership and discuss the myriad of issues we covered. Austin, thank you for the recent invitation to meet with your policy committee.

You are absolutely correct; this situation is not sustainable. CVS encounters over 20 thefts per day and the staff at Lululemon is on constant lookout for thieves. Both stores have hired security to the tune of over \$100,000 per year. Helly Hansen also loses \$1,000's in merchandise every week.

Fjallraven is leaving the street and Athleta has left, both due to falling sales and theft. Staff in many stores feel unsafe and local customers are leaving the Marketplace vowing to never return. Now as you mentioned there are "getaway" vehicles to quickly ferry away stolen goods in exchange for quick cash. I know of three (3) such vehicles (See photo attached)

All of us who work downtown know our community is under assault. Reading the police reports (See attached) indicates that there are no meaning consequences for both retail theft and more serious crimes. No accountability for "failures to appear", "violations of court order", "violations of probation/parole charges" the list goes on. The message this sends to the criminals is obvious. Keep stealing, selling drugs, assaulting people and nothing will happen to you.

It is sad to see our once great city falling apart with no answers in sight.



Subject: Urgent Request to Delay the Closure of Main St. & South Winooski Ave. Intersection During the Holiday Season

Dear Burlington City Councilors,

I am writing on behalf of the Burlington Business Association and its 250+ members regarding the proposed closure of the Main Street and South Winooski Avenue intersection, planned to begin on December 9 and extend for approximately eight weeks. This closure, during the crucial holiday season, has raised significant concerns among downtown businesses.

I was surprised by this announcement, especially after recent discussions with DPW Director Spencer, Church Street Marketplace Commissioners, and several city councilors. In those conversations, we highlighted the difficulties local businesses are facing, with many reporting sales declines of 40-50% compared to last year. Additionally, we discussed the persistent issues of retail theft and its negative impacts.

I am writing on behalf of the Burlington Business Association and its 250+ members regarding the proposed closure of the Main Street and South Winooski Avenue intersection, planned to begin on December 9 and extend for approximately eight weeks. BBA Memo on the FY2025 Budget to Actuals Review

On Monday, December 9th, the Board of Finance will receive a presentation on the FY2025 budget actuals through October 31, 2024, compared to the FY2024 actuals through October 31, 2023. Below, we have summarized some of the key concerns that stand out from this presentation.

Gross Receipts Revenue Shortfall:

Gross receipts are projected to fall short by \$1.27M, with gross sales down 9.8% year-over-year, part of a broader trend across Vermont but more pronounced in Burlington (-5.3%). This shortfall reflects declining economic activity. The city;s budget seems unlikely to realize the aggressive revenue projections tied to increased rates. If this trend continues, it could require mid-year adjustments that would impact city services or business-facing initiatives.

Rooms Tax Discrepancy:

Despite Burlington doubling the room tax rate, receipts are up only 60.3%, with gross sales down 4.8%. This is far below the nearly 100% increase expected from the tax change. This particular discrepancy could undermine confidence in revenue forecasts and the city's financial planning.

Local Option Tax (LOT) Lag:

LOT revenues are projected to miss budget by \$186K, with only one quarterly payment received so far. Timing issues may obscure the true revenue picture. Delays in state reimbursements or lower-than-expected taxable activity may indicate weaker-than-anticipated consumer spending.

Vacancy-Driven Budget Savings:

The city is "saving" \$4.4M in personnel costs due to a 14% vacancy rate in the Burlington Police Department and turnover across other departments. While this eases budget pressure, the high vacancy rate dramatically impacts public safety and service delivery, which directly affects the business environment.

Other notes:

- Despite being at 87% of the budget, projected investment revenue is expected to fall short of last year's actuals by nearly \$1M, suggesting the city may have changed its investment strategy.
- One way to connect this decrease in sales to downtown would be to gather the data only for businesses in the Designated Downtown. That could then be compared both to the city as whole and other cities like Winooski.

What we are hearing:

- Restaurant and retailers are reporting year over year losses of anywhere from just under 10 percent to over 30 percent. We plan to create more concrete data on this following the holiday season. We are holding out hope that the holiday season will be strong.
- Restaurants are all reporting that alcohol sales are down. This is consistent with the report on GRT.

Dear Kaitlin,

Thank you for sharing Proposed Permit amendment 4C1053-1C, which authorizes:

- 1. The suspension of the requirement established in item 4(b) of University of Vermont's (UVM's) Local Parking Management Plan (Exhibit #018 of LUP 4C1043-1), that UVM lease and utilize a 200-space off campus parking lot.
- 2. The elimination of Condition 11 of LUP 4C1043-1A, which required monthly parking utilization counts and the offsite parking requirement when parking utilization rates reached 83%.

UVM appreciates the Commission's willingness to make these adjustments in light of the City of Burlington's approval of the 2023-2028 Joint Institutional Parking Management Plan and issuance of a zoning permit (ZP-24-335) to permanently remove the city's conditions of the long-term lease of a 200-space off campus parking lot.

We are requesting that the Commission reconsider Condition #9 in the Proposed permit amendment 4C1043-1C, which reads:

9. The Permittee shall evaluate the parking utilization rates quarterly and provide this data to the District Commission as it becomes available. The submitted data will include a narrative explaining the method by which the parking utilization rate is assessed and reported.

To make Act 250 requirements consistent with the City of Burlington requirements, UVM is requesting that Condition #9 be amended to remove the quarterly reporting and instead require that UVM submit the JIPMP annual update to Act 250. This would be consistent with the requirement that UVM has with the City of Burlington through the Comprehensive Development Ordinance Section 8, Part 3: Institutional Parking Plans, which requires an Annual Report to be provided to the administrative officer. This is the only requirement that UVM currently has with

the City of Burlington to submit regular updates on parking utilization. There is no requirement for quarterly reporting.

Thank you for considering this change to the Proposed Permit Amendment.

Dear Sarah:

I have spoken with board members about whether we can support continued funding for this. Two important questions came up.

1) Is there any data to show that the CRC is successful in getting people to services, housed or to the treatment they need - some sort of key performance indicators? The data report indicates the number of people served. While CRC staff are consistently enrolling guests in Coordinated Entry and providing connections to resources and services for guests, I do not have that data point at this time.

2) Is there additional data from let's say a year to show how the service is being used? The CRC has been utilized by thousands of people over the last year (evidenced from the two monthly reports I shared with you). The CRC serves as a meal site for people experiencing homelessness, connection to services and resources, and daytime space for people without a low-barrier place to go. Without this daytime shelter space, people will not have access to daytime accommodation, meals, services, and supplies to meet basic needs. Other than the data reports indicating attendance, I am unsure how to represent the gap this vital resource fills. CRC staff also conduct outreach in the afternoons to people on the streets, camping, and unsheltered folks throughout the county.

#) Would the city be willing to end the lunch at the Marketplace Garage hosted by Food Not Cops and move those services to the CRC? As long as that program exists, it's challenging to make the argument that we are seeing a meaningful change in the number of community members requiring assistance in our downtown. The FNC lunches are outside the scope of this request. If you have questions about this, I would encourage you to follow-up with the Mayor's Office. If operation of a low-barrier daytime shelter isn't something the BBA is willing to advocate for, please let me know, and we will seek alternative routes for advocacy. Advocacy isn't a negotiating chip. My goals for BBA outreach were:

- Inform the BBA that this critical community resource was at risk of no longer existing
- Offer an avenue of support with advocacy, if BBA so desires
- Share data reports from CVOEO re. gap CRC services fill in our community for both people who are housed and people experiencing sheltered and unsheltered homelessness

Please let me know and I'm happy to continue to explore this with you.

I hope you are having a great day. I do need to send this as a reminder that CVOEO will need to close the Community Resource Center (CRC) on July 1st. I believe this is the largest outreach / day shelter site in the state for people experiencing homelessness. We saw 3,177 unique individuals over the past 12 months and had 32,233 visits. Over 50 % are unsheltered and over 80% have a disability. There are large disparities for disability, race, and age. The budget is \$545,000 and CVOEO provided an additional \$250,000 from our own fundraising for daily hot meals, essential needs, and groceries to go. We are letting you know of this impending closure because of the potential impact on the Burlington community and Chittenden County as a whole. The site at 228 is a regional facility as determined by the state (ACCD). We have been completely transparent with our valued team at the CRC and our CRC Coordinator has just taken another leadership role here at CVOEO. We are beginning to find our other team members positions here at CVOEO as they arise.

We have been advocating for continued funding since July 2024 and talked about the challenges of hosting this site year by year with no assurances of funding. This is no way to run an organization or work to support our team who has done everything for our community. We had hoped the CRC was going to be in the governor's budget. We have appreciated the responsiveness of the DMH staff who have visited the site, yet we have heard nothing from DMH higher leadership. We will need to let the public know in May about the planned closure and wanted to let you know in advance. Our hope is to do some limited case management at the site and perhaps provide sandwiches to go. It will no longer be a day shelter.

We have deeply appreciated our partnership with State and will continue to partner however we cannot keep this site open without committed funding and value our staff too much not to help them with other positions here at CVOEO or elsewhere.

I'd say our gate is in front of that portion of the building but is set back from the true 'front' of the building which is on the sidewalk. Also, the sliding style of gate is much more user-friendly than other styles.

I understand that we may not fit the exact letter of the code, but we're pretty close and bringing the gate into full compliance is causing some significant headaches with our property manager, amongst others in our office. I realize there were better ways of doing this, but I'd like to find a way to minimize the amount of cost and time we're all spending on this gate. Is there any world in which we remove the barbed wire and get the remaining gate approved and/or a way to apply for the building inspector's dangerous building provision? (The State building has a door into that alleyway, could we say that we're also securing that entrance?)

Also, I know this is not a concern with the zoning office, but we've already spent a considerable sum on this gate, and to tear it down and rebuild a more inconvenient option would incur further expense and hassle to secure a loading dock servicing one of the last remaining pharmacies downtown, which gets robbed 40+ times a day as it is, not to mention the slow down of business throughout the downtown (Many stores are down 30-50% from the same time last year). To further compound the issue, the office market downtown has not recovered at all from the pandemic, and many of the remaining office users are looking to escape the mayhem around here making it exceedingly difficult to lease the 22,000+ SF of vacant office space at 29 Church St resulting in a significant loss of annual revenue. The perception we feel in this office is that the city is kicking us while we're down, we're sorry we installed the gate 6" in the wrong direction, but we're trying to secure our building and prevent our remaining tenants from leaving us as well.

Hi Rvan.

The photo depicts the gate close to, but not in front of, the building. It is in the 2nd lot layer.

Your gate is in front of the building and would need to be changed to 4' tall or less and made of an acceptable material (i.e. like metal picket). There's more flexibility behind the front line of the building, but it would preclude a sliding gate. I've recently seen folding gates (like a sideways "Z") that could fit better into the alley space you've got. The DRB can't allow your gate as installed unless they somehow find basis to approve the variance.

Maybe I'm confused about the lot layers as the Always Full gate seems to be right on the sidewalk/building façade (photo attached) ...let me know if I'm missing something...

As for the barn door style gate, it would be too tight to locate the posts for that gate within the alleyway. The trucks wouldn't be able to fit in the loading dock. It's already very tight and there's very little, if any, elbow room. Is it within the DRB's ability to allow the gate to be located at its current lot depth, given that we can't push it back into the loading dock? (Assuming we will very likely have to make other changes to the gate, like removing the barbed wire)

The Always Full gate was permitted in the 2nd lot layer. So far as I know, that's as its been installed. A "barn door" gate (i.e. 2 pieces that swing out away from each other) would extend only half as far as a single gate.

Thank you for walking me through some of these examples, despite my frustration with the process generally, I do appreciate it.

Is the Always Full one within the First Lot Layer? If we're gonna have to give up the barbed wire, we'd want to get the max height we possibly can. Also, I meant to get greater clarity on the 20% variation applicability...is it within the DRB's powers to grant relief on the lot layer demarcation? We really need to keep the 'rolling' style gate, as a swinging gate will likely impact the sidewalk and has a bad habit of swinging back into the trucks. Also, given that it's only a 6" difference and doesn't greatly impact the character of the neighborhood, it seems like this we're creating a problem where there isn't one.

Final question (for now), was there a complaint about the gate that began this process? Given the larger and more visible violation

directly across the street, we'd like to understand how this all started.

Hi Ryan,

There's no specific limit to a height variance. I think what Evan was getting at is the provision for "alternative compliance" that allows up to 20% variation on dimensional standards, subject to DRB approval.

The case you make for a variance is up to you, but the provision to allow chain link per the building inspector's orders is aimed at securing dangerous buildings. There is no barbed wire around Memorial Auditorium. I verified in-person this morning.

The BCA gate was permitted in 2005. Well before the form code standards, but it looks like it would be permissible today. The one behind Manhattan Pizza shows up in a 2010 zoning permit for other work. It may have been associated with more extensive work in the early 1990's, but I didn't dig through all of the project files. The punchline is that it predates the current standards. The one by Always Full was permitted in 2020 and is limited to 8' tall.

The federal property is fully exempt from zoning (but the "picket" style fence and gates are permissible, albeit too tall). The state properties you've noted are subject to limited zoning review, not inclusive of design standards.

I wanted to follow up from yesterday about the loading dock gate at 29 Church Street to make sure I understood what the position of the DRB. The max height they could allow a variance up to was 56" correct? And could we qualify for that designated safety provision (?) under 14.6.8.b.5.b? (I think I got that right)

Also, I think the case could be made that the barbed wire on our gate protects the safety of individuals in much the same way that the barbed wire around Memorial does. Our building isn't falling down, but unauthorized access to our alleyway presents a danger to our employees, CVS's employees, the folks who pick up our trash/recycling, and the people who are using drugs back there.

Also, I wanted to check in about the other alleyway gates downtown. The one next to BCA (pg 4), the one behind Manhattan's Pizza (pg 4), and the one next to Always Full Market (pg 5) are all right on the building frontage and over 4', and maybe over 8'? In our potential redesign, could we use those metal spikes like the one behind Always Full (pg 5) and the Federal Building (pg 10)? In addition, are the gates around the Courthouse (pg 6 & 7) far enough back that they not within the first lot layer and/or is the Courthouse also exempt from local zoning rules?

There is a loading dock in the rear of the building with a curb cut on Cherry Street. We are trying to secure this loading dock with a gate to prevent people from injecting drugs, urinating, and defecating on our property which is unsafe and unsanitary for our tenants and service people. We are requesting that the installed gate be allowed to remain until the issue of public drug use, urination, and defecation has been solved by the city. We have owned this property for many years and have not had issues maintaining the cleanliness of the alleyway until the past few years where we have seen a marked rise in people trespassing on our property. We believe we should be granted this variance, because there is no other reasonable way to secure the alleyway against this unauthorized use.

We had to install a gate to secure the CVS loading dock and were told by the city that the gate we installed was not allowed under the current code. We're also not the only property owners with this issue, I understand the Ronald McDonald House is also trying to increase their fencing. 14.6.8- SITE AND LANDSCAPE STANDARDS

Purpose and Applicability. Landscaping shall be used to add visual interest, scale, and color to the development site and to provide specific functions and benefits to the uses and Buildings on the site. These include but are not limited to stormwater retention and erosion control, winter windbreaks and summer shade, recreational and habitat corridors, buffers and screening of parking areas, and creating privacy for and from adjacent property. The following are required in each Form District.

Site Standards:

- All utility service connections shall be underground for new construction, and is recommended for existing Buildings undergoing Substantial Modification.
- The following items are prohibited in the First Lot Layer: electrical transformers, exhaust vents, HVAC, and other mechanical equipment unless they are placed underground; utility or gas meters; solar collection devices and wind turbines; antennas, satellite dishes, and other telecommunications equipment; solid waste containers, swimming pools, dog houses and runs, hot tubs, and spas,
- iii. Ground level electrical transformers, HVAC, and other mechanical equipment; antennas, satellite dishes and other telecommunications equipment; and utility boxes and gas meters shall be designed so they do not Encroach on walkways or parking areas, and shall be screened from view from any Public Frontage. They shall not be obstructed by landscaping or hardscape such that meter readers and maintenance personnel are unable to open or Access utilities devices.
- iv. Utility boxes and gas meters located Adjacent to Driveways, Parking Areas, Rear Lanes, Alleys, or Rear Access Easements, shall require 2 48-inch high, 6-in x 6-in bollards set in concrete to protect them from damage from vehicles.
- Fences and Free-standing Walls:
 - A. Fences and Free-standing Walls placed within the First Lot Layer shall not exceed 4-feet in height. Fences and Free-standing Walls placed within the Second or Third Lot Layer shall not exceed 8-feet in height unless a different height limit is specified under the applicable Form District or Frontage Type.
 - B. Materials used for Fences and Free-standing Walls shall be limited to Brick and tile masonry; Native or sintered stone; Wood panels, clapboard or shingles; Cementitious siding, metal, and woven or braided cable wire. Chain-link and welded-wire fencing shall not be used along any Frontage Line with the exception of the temporary 20 enclosure of a construction site, or where required by the Building Official to protect public safety. Barbed or razor wire shall not be used in any application. Alternate materials may be approved by the Administrative Officer after seeking input from the Design Advisory Board. Alternate materials must be considered equivalent or better than the materials listed above, and must demonstrate successful, high quality local installations. Regionally-available materials are preferred.
 - C. All fences and free-standing walls shall be installed so that a finished side faces outward towards the adjacent property or public Frontage.

Landscape Standards: c)

- The installed landscape shall consist primarily of durable species tolerant of urban conditions, and pre-existing noxious or invasive plants species identified on the prohibited plant list shall be removed.
- The spacing and placement of all installed plants shall be adequate and appropriate for the typical size, shape, and habit of the plant species at maturity.
- Bare and exposed ground on the site and/or in landscaped areas shall be covered with live plant materials and/or Mulch, with the exception of naturally occurring dunes, creek beds, rock outcroppings, or similar landscape features typically lacking in vegetation; and clay or sand surfaces associated with recreation fields and facilities.
- Pervious paving materials are encouraged for any paved areas in order to increase storm water infiltration on site.
- Constructed water features, such as fountains, streams, and ponds that operate with water recirculation systems, shall be designed to prevent seepage and leaks.
- Plantings should be placed at or slightly below grade, and not be mounded up, in order to provide opportunities for storm water infiltration
- vii. Ground vegetation or Shrub plantings with spines, thorns, or needles that may present hazards to pedestrians, bicyclists or vehicles are prohibited in the first 2 feet of the First Lot Layer.
